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

Symphony presents 'Halloween Spooktacular'

The Mid-Columbia Symphony will continue its 75th-anniversary season with "Halloween Spooktacular" at Hanford High School on November 2 at 7:30 p.m. This concert will feature the musicians and their conductor, Nicholas Wallin, dressed in costume and performing spine-tingling and bone-chilling symphonic works that provoke the hysteria and excitement that Halloween brings each fall.

Come in costume and participate in the Mid-Columbia Symphony Costume Contest! Prizes for best costume will be announced from the stage after intermission.

Halloween Spooktacular includes the terror-inducing piece, "Night on Bald Mountain," by Russian composer Modest Mussorgsky. Made popular by its feature in Disney's *Fantasia*, this frighteningly artistic piece was completed by Mussorgsky on June 23, 1867, just 12 days after he began composing it! Originally called *St John's Night on the Bald Mountain*, this work is a tone poem depicting a

witches' Sabbath on St. John's Eve, the very night (June 23) when he finished it.

A Halloween season classic, *Funeral March of a Marionette* was written and orchestrated by Charles Gounod in 1879. This short, quirky piece is best known as the theme music for the television program "Alfred Hitchcock Presents." It begins with strings narrating a duel between marionettes. One of the puppets is killed and there is soon a procession of pallbearers marching to the cemetery. The main melody is sung by the clarinet. After a while, a few of the puppets leave this march for refreshment at a tavern and then fall back in line as this perky but eerie piece draws to a close.

Camille Saint-Saens finished composing his Opus 40, *Danse Macabre* in 1874. It is based on an old French superstition and poem written by Henri Cazalis. *Danse Macabre* is also called *The Dance of Death*, and according to the superstition, "Death" appears at midnight every year on

Halloween and plays his fiddle to awake the dead from their graves. His skeletons dance for him until the break of dawn, when they return to their graves until the next Halloween. This piece is sure to bring out ghosts and goblins and all things that go bump in the night!

These three dreadfully amazing works will be featured along with other popular selections from *Psycho*, *Harry Potter*, *Batman*, and *Phantom of the Opera*.

This concert will be performed at Hanford High School instead of Richland High for this concert only. Tickets and space are limited, so purchase as soon as possible!
